Snowshoe Adventures: Again this year, Maine did not disappoint with the conditions and availability of great snow shoe trails in and around Newry, Maine. Luckily the weather was not as cold as last year, but definitely more precipitation. Sunday night, a snow storm came though and continued throughout the morning. The skiers even had a delay that morning while the slopes were being groomed. Driving to a trail was a concern, so the snowshoe adventurers this year, **Wendy Bartel** and **Karen Dash**, found a trail right at the hotel. Another trek was accomplished that day at the Sunday River Golf Club, which provided some beautiful scenery. In total we hiked 4 miles.

Tuesday, the weather was clear, so we traveled to the Bethel Community Forest near Bethel, Maine. There we snowshoed the Summit Ridge Trail to the West Ledge for some beautiful views of the surrounding area, which included the Bingham Forest Valley. This was a repeat trail but still very nice. We hiked about 3 ½ miles. Wednesday was the nicest weather day, so we travelled a little further to a new trail we had not hiked on any prior visits to Sunday River. This trail was at the Rumford Whitecap Mountain Preserve in Rumford, Maine. The trail, which leads the way to the Whitecap summit, was well marked and packed down with deep snow. On this very nice trail through pine trees and fields of Maine, we hiked about 5 ½ miles.







Elk Mountain Trip Roe Crowley



For decades, Philadelphia Ski Club has had a "home-mountain" relationship with Elk Mountain. Bus trips to Union Dale in Susquehanna County were a staple for tuning up your skis and legs for ski season. After a few zzz's on the bus, we all became accustomed to a morning bagel or donut and trivia quiz provided by Miram McCauley for the ride to the mountain.

Sometime in the late '90s, under the leadership of **Meg Waldowski** and **Terry Liebel**, it was discovered that if the Club ran two trips to Elk each year, credits from the two trips could be applied toward a third trip. As a result, Philadelphia Ski Club has been running three trips to Elk – the first Fridays of January, February and March – for many years. The March trip has been capped off with a Happy Hour prior to boarding the bus for the sleepy ride home. About ten years ago, Dave and Marion Brown picked up the mantle and continued to pack buses running successful day-trips to Elk. The success of the trips afforded the Board to approve more amenities, such as hand-&-foot warmers, hoagie lunches, après ski taco bar parties with wine & beer.

As with every facet of normal life, COVID-19 changed how we could run our memorable Elk Mountain day-trips. The Federal Transportation Authority limited the number of passengers that could ride a bus, required masks be worn by all riders, and prohibited the consumption of food and drink, taking away much of the fun and many of the benefits of the bus trip. As a result, Hagey Bus Company – the company we had used for as long as we can remember – closed its doors and went out of business.

Resurrecting the Elk Mountain bus trips has been a challenge for Philadelphia Ski Club. Immediately following the "return to normal life" many folks were hesitant to board a bus with 50 other folks and resisted the mask wearing mandate. The inflation impact of the pandemic raised fixed costs for chartering buses and Elk Mountain lift tickets, resulting in price points for which we are unaccustomed. However, we are committed to our local skiing and Elk Mountain.

As many of you will remember, PSC had planned a bus trip for January 6, 2023, but due to the unusually warm weather and poor snowfall, we had to reschedule for February 3rd. The weather in February was decidedly colder than January and when we arrived at Elk, we were greeted with single digit temps, blustery-high winds with on-and-off snow squalls. Forty-one hearty souls braved the weather and limited trails, but enjoyed our renewed efforts to Elk. On the bus ride home snacks, cookies and "nutty Irishmen" were shared and enjoyed by all. I want to thank all who joined us for their camaraderie and commitment to Philadelphia Ski Club.

Your Board is committed to running trips to meet the desires and needs of all our members. Plans are already in place for Elk Mountain in 2024 and I look forward to seeing you all on the mountain!
